Subject	Unaccompanied Children	Date/Source
National Transfer Scheme (NTS)	The National Transfer scheme was launched on 1 July 2016 to assist in the transfer of unaccompanied children regardless of their mode of arrival into the UK e.g. if children come direct from a refugee camp via a resettlement programme or via ports of entry for example. Since it commenced the NTS has assisted over 550 children. A cluster limit of 0.07% of child population has been set by the Home Office. Despite best efforts, some young people are waiting a long time to access services such as suitable education, long-term accommodation and health assessments and some LAs are finding it difficult to absorb any new children safely. The majority of unaccompanied children coming through the NTS are generally older (62% aged 16 or 17) and male (91%).	Home Office 2 <sup>nd</sup> April 2018
	At this stage, assisting with unaccompanied children is voluntary and transfer will only occur if a LA has indicated they can accommodate. However, the Home Office has asked LAs to work with the NEMP urgently, which has led to a number of requests over recent months, due to pressure in the system and a lack of overall pledges for the NE. Initially the Partnership was working towards commitments to the end of the last financial year. It was hoped this would provide a platform for a pipeline of unaccompanied arrivals and a rota of arrivals could be established with other regions. The NE is currently operating on a case by case basis with LAs and the NEMP will be writing to Leaders and Elected Mayors in early May to seek further commitments for pledges to assist for 2018/19.	

Subject	Unaccompanied Children	Date/Source
	In 2017/18 the North East Migration Partnership had within its work programme an objective to work with Local Authorities to increase the capacity of foster care, supported lodgings and supported housing to meet the needs of a range of unaccompanied asylum seeking children. In working towards this objective, the Partnership has carried out a number of actions, including:-	
	i) Provided assistance to facilitate a sub-regional foster care event. Darlington Assistance for Refugees (DAR) took a leading role in coordinating the event, including booking speakers, developing publicity material, press releases and giving radio interviews. DAR worked with the Adoption and Fostering Team from Penny Appeal who helped to design and produce the publicity materials. The event was attended by representatives from Durham and Tees Valley Fostering and Supported Lodgings Teams, a number of existing and potential foster carers, as well as young people who have been looked after. It provided an excellent opportunity for foster carers and young people to share their experiences. The guest speaker was Gulwali Passarlay, author of "A Lightless Sky", he spoke of his extraordinary journey as a 12 year old Afghan boy and his experience with British foster carers.

	lii)	Arranged an event aimed at bringing together LA UASC leads, commissioners and housing and support providers to share experience and good practice in the delivery of housing and support for unaccompanied asylum seeking young people. More than 35 people attended, with representation from 10 local authorities and 13 housing and support providers from across the region. Guest speakers included representatives from UK Visa and Immigration (UKVI) and the Department for Education (DfE) who covered the National Transfer Scheme (NTS) and key considerations when commissioning services. Also speaking at the event were representatives from Gateshead and Hartlepool Councils, Community Campus and BACA, a specialist accommodation and support service for UASC in the East Midlands. The event provided the opportunity for group discussion about how good quality, affordable housing and support services for UASC can be delivered in the region.	

Subject	Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Scheme (VPRS) and Vulnerable Children's Resettlement Scheme (VCRS)	Date/Source
VPRS	In 2015 the Government committed to resettle 20,000 Syrian refugee families from camps in the Middle East and North Africa Region (MENA) by 2020.	Home Office 22 <sup>nd</sup> February 2018
	Following a policy change last year, any family who had made Syria their home and had to flee as a result of the conflict now qualifies for resettlement. This could be families where only one of the adults is a Syrian national and the spouse holds another passport – or whole families who had made their lives in Syria and have fled in the same way that their Syrian neighbours had to.	
	The quarterly Home Office immigration statistics showed that 10,538 refugees have been resettled on the VPRS. The VPRS is just one of the routes by which the UK is helping to resettle refugees. In 2017, a total of 6,212 people were resettled in the UK - a 19% increase on 2016. Some 539 people arrived under VCRS which will resettle up to 3,000 at-risk children and their families from the Middle East and North Africa by 2020.	
	In our region arrivals are progressing well and partnerships are maturing and the revised Multi-Agency meetings for migration issues are providing a useful format for exchange on all matters refugee and asylum related with LAs and key partners.

Integrated Communities Strategy and Consultation	The Government's Integrated Communities Strategy was published on the 14 <sup>th</sup> March 2018. It is a wide-ranging cross-Government strategy, with commitments from Government as well as areas for consultation. 	The Strategy sets out the Government's intention to increase integration support for <u>all</u> refugees, including non-resettled refugees (those granted refugee status through the asylum system). The commitment is to work with civil society on how we can collectively do this.  The strategy sets out an approach that seeks to develop and share good practice across four strands of integration activity:  • English language learning • Employment • Mental health and wellbeing • Cultural orientation	
	We intend to use the some of our meetings and events to help formulate a consultation response and develop the approach going forward in a collaborative way with civil society partners.  We hope this is welcome news and look forward to working with many of you to implement this important development in Government policy on refugee integration.

National Conversation on Immigration	Below is a summary on the National Conversation on Immigration Interim Report. This sets out findings from the first 30 National Conversation visits. The report has been launched at the same time as the <a href="Home Affairs Select Committee">Home Affairs Select Committee</a> publishes the report of its own inquiry on immigration. 	British Future is working with HOPE not hate to give the public a voice in the policy debate about the immigration system that the UK needs after Brexit. Over a 15 month period, they will visit 60 towns and cities across the UK, where they will meet with local stakeholders and also run citizens' panels with members of the public. There is also an open online survey.	
	There will be a final report for August or September 2018. The National Conversation on Immigration aims to engage the public about the future direction of immigration policy, and to see if there is common ground on which there can be more agreement.	
	The importance of public engagement	National
	Polls across the country suggest there is little public confidence in the way Immigration is handled. Employers have also expressed frustrations about the difficulty in recruiting overseas staff and the bureaucracy involved in securing work visas. Organisations working with refugees remain concerned about backlogs and the quality of initial asylum decisions. Brexit offers a window of opportunity to reform immigration policy, and to put in place a system that protects genuine refugees, works for employers and commands broad public support. But this support will not be won without hearing and responding to public concerns. The National Conversation seeks to provide a conduit for these views. It aims to:  • Create a robust evidence base of public views on immigration reform.  • Examine if it is possible to build a consensus on immigration policy and, if so, what steps are needed to do this. 	<ul> <li>Engage those with less voice in policy decisions, for e.g. young people and those who live outside big cities.</li> <li>Contribute to increased public confidence and engagement in immigration politics in ways that engage anxieties effectively, and so build resilience against prejudice.</li> </ul>

Transition Advice Fund	The <u>Transition Advice Fund</u> is a partnership between three charitable foundations (the Paul Hamlyn Foundation, Unbound Philanthropy and the Legal Education Foundation) and is aimed at ensuring that EU citizens are able to secure settled status through the government's settlement scheme—recognising that there are likely to be various groups who find this more difficult.  You may have seen coverage in the news of research (supported by the Fund) which was published yesterday by the Migration Observatory. <u>Unsettled status? Which EU citizens are at risk of failing to secure their rights after Brexit?</u> This sets out what is known about people who may be at risk through the settlement scheme—whether due to a lack of awareness, difficulty evidencing their rights or other issues. The Controlling Migration Fund (CMF)	The purpose of the Government's Controlling Migration Fund (CMF) is to provide additional support for L.A's in areas experiencing pressures linked to recent immigration. The Fund will be available over the four years from 2016-17 to 2019-20. Unlike previous similar funds the Controlling Migration Fund focuses on responding to the problems caused by high migration into localities as identified by local authorities. The Fund has two parts:  1. A local service impacts part of £100m, to help English local authorities and their communities experiencing high and unexpected volumes of immigration to ease pressures on local services. Restart Refugee Support Programme	The Restart Refugee Support (RRS) programme has as its primary goal to contribute to the rapid economic adjustment of professional refugees resettled in the UK by supporting individuals' own efforts towards self-sufficiency.	Restart Refugee Support 30 <sup>th</sup> April 2018
	The RRS programme provides cost and interest-free loans for activities which lay the groundwork for durable economic integration. The programme is based on the belief that financial independence brought about by economic integration gives people choices, drives growth in their economies and inspires others to look at self-sufficiency in their communities.	
Goldman Sachs Syria Grant Fund	The Syria Grant Fund is a national fund to support and enable resettled refugees from Syria to access employment, training and education opportunities. It also allows them to develop their English language skills. Funded by Goldman Sachs Gives, and administered by the Refugee Council, this fund will give resettled refugees from Syria access to vital resources to facilitate and enhance their integration into British life. Grants will be paid directly to individuals, and not to any organisations supporting them. The Grant Fund is open throughout the year and applications can be made at any time. 	Anyone who has been resettled to the UK under the VPRS - of any nationality - can apply for financial support to access employment, education or training opportunities; either for themselves and/or their families. The fund is also open to people wishing to improve their level of English to enable them to move closer to the labour market. Individuals resettled via the Community Sponsorship Scheme can also apply. The Grant Fund is to meet the cost of specific items which relate to the individual moving towards employment or education, for example clothing for an interview, fees to access a College Course, or childcare costs to enable someone to attend a training course. The Grant Fund does not cover costs for any electronic equipment such as mobile phones, laptops or tablets. However the Fund can support an application for financing an IT course, to enable someone to improve their computer skills and search for work online.

	Learn English Together (LET)  In June 2017 a grant was provided to Action Foundation's Learn English Together (LET) project. The LET project is working with small community groups who want to help refugees develop their English language informally. Groups either have the will to help but lack the knowledge to start such a group, or have started to offer some provision but would like support to establish this further. Action Foundation's LET have started to roll out their training, support and resource packs which is greatly developing informal ESOL capacity in the region.  Trying to develop/improve ESOL services in your area and interested in sharing good practice?  The NEMP is pleased to support ESOL based events in the north and the south of the region for formal, non-formal providers and LA's seeking to network/learn how to develop ESOL services in their local are. NEMP will be using these sessions to launch their "How to Teach Basic English guide".  This resource can be used to help volunteers and new tutors train staff on how to teach beginners. It was developed by our ESOL Coordinator and will be widely distributed to all networks after the event and will be available from the <a href="https://www.nemp.org.uk">www.nemp.org.uk</a> website.  Discussions will also progress at the event on how to improve ESOL, barriers and priorities; hosted by Action Foundation on behalf of the NEMP. The event at Newcastle on 3 May 2017 was well attended and generated a lot of enthusiasm and ideas for the NEMP plan plus it generated some new ESOL volunteers! ESOL	Below is a wide range of work which has been conducted by the NEMP's ESOL coordinator for the year of 2017 and a range of ESOL which is on offer to L.A's, VCS and Community groups.	
	Mapping Tool	26 <sup>th</sup> March 2018
	A Regional ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) map has been created and has had regular updates over the last few months. The map has been widely welcomed as a useful referral tool. By the 26 <sup>th</sup> March 2018 the map has been viewed 1137 times since its completion in June 2017. 	The ESOL Coordinator's regional work identified that learners coming into ESOL classes under VPRS are often at a very low level and that in many cases tutors are finding this a new challenge. Some tutors feel they lack the skills and confidence to work with this level of learner. A two day training programme was designed based around areas of need for professional development identified by tutors across the region. The training especially targeted those involved in the delivery of ESOL to Syrians under the resettlement schemes but was open to all tutors across the region. The first session took place on December 1 <sup>st</sup> and was attended by 39 tutors. Feedback from this session was very good and requests for additional content are being included in the design of day 2 of training which took place in January 2018.	
	We have developed a "Help Beginners Learn English Guide" and this will be launched in May 2018, with a lead from Action Foundation who will also promote their work on rolling out Learning English Together (LET) to help train and support volunteers who deliver or want to deliver ESOL in local areas. The events will focus on enabling networking for informal and formal ESOL providers, providing an opportunity to look at the guide and resources, problem solving on issues for effective delivery moving forward to inform the NEMP work plan for 2018/19.
